Another fantastic week of learning in Nyong'o class! This week we have been learning all about dragons and talking about what our dragon would be like if we had one! We used the book 'Tell me a dragon' by Jackie Morris to help us and it inspired some fantastic dragon creations and language from the children. Here are a few examples...'My dragon is as hot as the sun.' 'My dragon has super speed.' 'It's heart is even harder than metal.' In Maths this week we have been reminding ourselves how to add two groups of objects together and have started to learn how to add by counting on. We loved solving the numicon challenge in the water area and dragon counting challenge in the maths area! Wild Wednesday was a lovely sunny afternoon and everyone worked brilliantly in pairs to find signs of spring! In RE we talked about the Easter story and in our Understanding the World morning we talked about some of the things that humans do which isn't very good for our planet. The children had some brilliant ideas about this...'Hunters hunt animals and that's not good for our world.' 'People throw rubbish into the water

and onto the ground and birds and other animals try to eat it.'

We have also looked at the names of different spring flowers and used our observational drawing skills to draw them. Don't they look beautiful?












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Johnson Class






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Kahlo Class






Sentamu Class

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York Schools and Families Update

Keep testing!

Thank you to parents and carers of children attending nursery, school or college for taking regular symptom-free Covid tests. These can be taken at home or at one of our community test centres.

Symptom-free testing sites

Families with a child of secondary school age can book regular symptom-free tests at one of our three community testing sites, together with their child secondary school aged or over. Visit york.gov.uk/SymptomFreeCOVIDtest for more information and to book.

This testing is available for parents and carers of children of all ages and secondary school pupils.

If you are self-isolating as a contact of a confirmed case, please do not attend one of our sites.

Collect home testing kits

Parents and carers with children at nursery, primary school, secondary school or college can collect symptom free test kits to do at home at the Poppleton Bar Park & Ride drive through test site, or the Wentworth Way walk-in site at the University of York, between the hours of 1.30pm and 7pm each day. An appointment is not necessary. You can check to make sure the site is open or how busy it is by visiting https://find-covid-19-rapid-test-sites.maps.test-and-trace.nhs.uk.

Ordering home testing kits online

If you cannot get to the testing sites to take a test or collect a testing kit, you can order kits for home delivery at https://www.gov.uk/ordercoronavirus-rapid-lateral-flow-tests. Your test results

If you or anyone in your household shows any Covid symptoms, regardless of their age, you must book a Covid test at https://www.nhs.uk/coronavirus or by calling 119. If you or your child's test comes back negative, you can carry on with your normal plans, remembering to practice Hands, Face, Space as the test is for one point in time and you could catch the virus at any point.

Getting tested at a testing site

If you or your child's test comes back positive, you and your household have a legal responsibility to self-isolate for ten days. You do not need another test to confirm the positive result.

Home testing

If you get a positive test from a home test kit, you must then self isolate and book a Covid test to confirm the result at https://www.nhs.uk/coronavirus or by calling 119.

If the NHS test comes back negative, you do not need to self isolate. If it is positive, you and your household have a legal responsibility to self isolating for ten days.

2. Support for families over the Easter holidays

Over the Easter half term holiday City of York Council are providing funding for schools to provide food vouchers for young people eligible for free school meals.

Schools will be responsible for ordering and delivering the vouchers to cover the two weeks of half term. Eligible families should be contacted directly by their school.

Eligible families across the city will also have access to a holiday activity programme this Easter.

The programme is being funded through the government's Holiday Activities and Food programme (HAF), which provides healthy food and activities to targeted children.

Children and young people who are eligible to take part in the programme will be contacted directly by their school.

3. Easter activity ideas

If you're looking for ways to keep your little ones entertained and active over the Easter half term, Shine will be sharing a range of crafts and ideas.

4. Census 2021 is in full swing in York.

The letters, with your unique access codes, have all gone out and responses are already coming in.

Results will be available within 12 months, although personal records will be locked away for 100 years, kept safe for future generations.

Operating in line with the Government's latest Covid-19 guidance, field officers will be deployed across the country to contact those who have not responded. They will offer help and advice to those who need it. They will also remind people that their census response is required by law.
