Covid Update

Road Safety

It can be hard knowing how best to teach your child to stay safe. Here we help you to break it down and keep it simple.

Pedestrians - younger children

- Get young children into the habit of holding your hand or use walking reins
- Ask questions while you're out to help them understand simple ideas like 'fast' and 'slow'
- You can start teaching the Green Cross Code from age five, encouraging children to stop, look, listen and think
- But they won't always remember safety rules, especially if they're excited or spot a friend across the road
- Children will copy what you do, so try to avoid stepping into the road without checking for traffic first. If you can do the right thing, it will help them get into good habits.

Pedestrians - older children

- Children find it difficult judging the speed and distance of traffic until they're at least eight.
 Accidents peak around 12, as children start making independent journeys
- Children learn by doing and practising. If they're moving to a new school, help them practise the route over the holidays. Where are the safe places to cross? What should they do if they see their bus and they're on the other side of the road?
- They can be mesmerised by their mobiles, so remind them not to talk or text on their phones or listen to music while crossing the road.

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Nyong'o Class



We have finished writing our non-chronological reports all about Blue Whales this week and I could not be more proud of the resilience and hard work the children have put into these! 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Johnson Class

What beautiful weather we have had this week! We have enjoyed a variety of activities, from writing a diary from the point of view of Tim Peake, to planting seeds, to making rockets, to having fun with YoYo!

In our diary entry, we have focused on using the present tense and the first person to pretend we really were Tim Peake exploring the International Space Station. All our incredible research from last week really paid off! We had a wonderful time imagining what fun he had way up in space. Our art also reflected our Tim Peake research, as we created a rocket for him to fly into space with. We have also begun our topic of Statistics in Maths and have made tally charts about people's favourite foods. We found out that Mrs Murrie really, really loves chips!

In Science, we planted some wildflower seeds and have begun an experiment. One group of seeds is outside, one group is inside by the window, and one group is hidden in Miss Swan and Mrs Murrie's cupboard! We made predictions about which one would grow the strongest, and we decided that the seeds outside will grow the best as they have the most sunlight. In PE, we have continued developing our skills in Tennis (I think we have some future Wimbledon Champions!) and we practiced singing beautiful rounds in Music. In Computing, we researched Andy Goldsworthy and his incredible land art before taking the iPads out onto the field and creating our own. We made sculptures with different living materials and took photos, just like Andy Goldsworthv.

We also had a lot of fun with YoYo this week! They came in to help us explore the school virtues even more alongside a few more. We had a creative corner, a courage corner, a compassion corner, and a calm corner. As a team, we worked together to explore each of the virtues; we especially liked our calm corner, where we all chilled out and had a chat about the things that make us proud!Well done for your fantastic work this week, Johnson. Farah class has been carrying on with our learning about fractions. Did you know that if you have all the parts of a fraction you have the whole! We have learnt that if the numerator and the denominator are the same, then that is equivalent to one whole!

We have also continued our Stone Age, Bronze Age and Iron Age topic learning about the progression of hunter gatherers to farmers in the Stone Age. Last week, we pretended we were a tribe (Farah tribe) and tried to find food sources in the school grounds (including a wild boar)! We then played a game to see if we could keep our tribe alive! This week, we are comparing the two types to decide which we would rather be and why!

In English we are learning about when to use paragraphs in our writing, before seeing if we can apply our new learning in a setting description. We have been seeing if we can spot where a new paragraph should begin.

In our reading lessons this week, the class has been learning the very important skill of summarising using the fabulous novel *The Invention of Hugo Cabret. It really focused their minds on keeping to a budget as well as helping their reading skills!*

In our science topic on Changes, we have seen how, if we were to continue to grow at the same rate as we do as babies, we would be 3 metres tall as adults! The children were also subjected to some highly disturbing pictures of me as a baby all the way up to being a teenager. Scary! 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Childminder recruitment - Could you offer childcare to children living in the Leeman Road area of York?

Registered childminders are professional childcarers who work in their own homes to provide care and education for other people's children. They are registered and inspected by OFSTED. There are currently approximately 130 childminders registered in the city of York.

Registered childminders are self employed and are responsible for their own tax and National Insurance. They are not "employed" by parents but negotiate a contract for their service for which they charge a fee. It is important to remember that all childminders need to have an inclusion policy that ensures that every child's needs are met.

Why should I consider becoming a childminder?

Childminding is a rewarding career, and provides opportunities for developing new skills and qualifications.

Childminding provides you with the opportunity to:

- Contribute to children's development and learning
- Run your own business
- Work from home
- Provide a valuable service for your local community
- Develop new skills and qualifications

How do I become a childminder?

It is a big decision to become a childminder so it is important you have all the facts and make an informed decision. To help you to do this:

Prospective childminders may also need to complete an initial childminder training course before registering with Ofsted. This can be undertaken online through various providers.
