Well done Nyong'o, another brilliant week!

We had an unexpected visitor in Nyong'o class this week- a dragon! Whilst the children were outside, a dragon crept in and destroyed the classroom! We worked really hard to write instructions for how to (humanley) catch him. We had some fantastic, creative ideas and very clear instructions. Thankfully, we had practised following instructions the day before when we made cakes to explore the changing states of matter of the solid ingredients, the liquid cake mix and then the yummy solid cakes!

This week in phonics we have focused on 's' and 'es' suffixes such as 'floats' and 'splashes' as well as reading longer words such as 'crunches' and 'balloon'.

Shapes were the focus of maths this week. We discussed the 2D shapes we could see in the faces of the 3D shapes and used paint to explore it. We went on a shape hunt in the classroom to find spheres, cylinder, cubes, cuboids and pyramids, we found them everywhere!

PE this week was practice for sports day races. We practised running, hurdling and an obstacle course too. I was really impressed with how fast Nyong'o are!

On Wednesday afternoon, we had some visitors from the National Railway Museum. We watched lots of fun science happen right in front of us! We learned about forces and how they push or pull and also what happens if we sit on a balloon or poke it with a pin.

We painted our coil clay pots in art this week and added some glitter to give them an extra sparkle. Nyong'o class have shown how kind and caring they are this week. We had our new friends from playgroup come in to play with us a few times this week, ahead of joining the class in September. Nyong'o class have shown the new children around the classroom and the best things to do in there!

Attenborough

A foody week for Attenborough this week. We started the week making some delicious smoothies in DT. The children chopped their own fruit and we mixed them and tried each other's smoothies. The children were incredibly



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careful and helpful to each other.

In computing we carried on our exploring of Scratch with adding more than one character and background.

In science we discussed how fruit and vegetables grow and their differences and similarities and in history we looked at the different parts of plants and what they are made from.

children were visited by volunteers from the NRM and they had a great STEM session with the rest of EVES and



the rest of EYFS and KS1.

In maths this week the children have excelled with their learning on capacity, thinking about greater and less than with liquid and containers. In phonics we have learnt some more graphemes for the 'sh' sound: ti, ssi, si, ci.

In English we have started reading our first class novel - Winnie the Pooh and started our learning on instructions for making Pooh a honey sandwich. We even had a go at following instructions



to make our own honey sandwich!

I have set some challenging questions over the past few weeks and the children have really risen to the challenge. I have been impressed by how much their comprehension skills have improved. In maths the children have continued with mass and have been comparing different weights this week. The children are really challenging themselves in their work and I was very impressed with their perseverance in all our maths sessions this week. We will be finishing weights next week and moving on to temperature.

In P.E we have been further practising our athletic skills ready for Sports Day. It was lovely to see the children cheering each other on in practice. They listened well to Mr Scaling's instructions and all competed well.

In DT, we have been continuing our work on building castles. We used polygon to see how much stronger 3D shapes are than 2D, then started to explore making 3D shapes from paper nets.

The Year 4s have also been working on their geometry, and like Year 3, have been learning about angles in shapes and how to compare them. Ms Graustone was delighted to hear some people have been looking at angles over dinner using forks and knives to create right angles and acute angles!

We've dived into profit and loss, value for money

and even unit versions.



All the while, the Year 5s have conquered their place value revision, and showcased wonderful understanding.

In reading, we've been thinking about gaming reading a story where the protagonist is sucked into her game, as well as learning about the history of gaming from the 1970s onwards. Our English has seen us wrapping up our poetry units and beginning to analyse and produce discussions and balanced arguments. They've really taken to this, and we've got some budding politicians, lawyers and public speakers in our midst.

We also had Yo-Yo, who came in to deliver a workshop for our Year 6 children about transition

and secondary school. The children were incredibly well behaved, and responded brilliantly to everything!

Overall, a brilliant week and the children are doing wonderfully!



Super Science Show

On Wednesday, the whole school was treated to a super STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) workshop, delivered by the National Railway Musuem. The KS2 workshop looked at a range of forces, including air resistance, pressure and friction, all in the context of railways and trains. It even saw Xander and Mr Levick competing to see who could launch a shot put further!

The children were brilliantly behaved and learnt a lot about how forces work in the real world. It was a hugely exciting opportunity as we were the first school to see this show before it is offered to other schools. As it hasn't yet been given a title, children were given the chance to vote on their preferred title for the show too. The NRM have asked us to be their 'partner school' so we look forward to working with the museum to bring more of these exciting workshops to school. There are some big changes planned to the NRM over the next few years and hopefully our children can play some part in shaping some of them too.



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SEND

We are launching our SEND Outcomes Framework

In York, we want all children and young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities (SEND) to be happy and live the best lives they can. That's why we and the NHS Vale of York Clinical Commissioning Group have worked with parents, carers and young people with SEND to produce a set of outcomes that we all want to achieve for our children and young people.

These 7 SEND Outcomes are:

- 1. I am healthy
- 2. I have a choice and I am heard
- 3. I am safe
- 4. I achieve my goals
- 5. I am included
- 6. I can overcome challenges and difficulties on my own or with support
- 7. I am becoming independent

Each outcome will look different for each child so for a more in-depth list of descriptors, visit <u>www.yor-ok.org.uk/outcomes-framework.htm</u>

The outcomes framework will change the way we work and the way we measure how effective we are in supporting children and young people with Special Educational Needs and Disabilities. Our measure of success will whether children and young people can show or tell us that *everything* we do is supporting them to achieve these outcomes.

We will use this framework when we:

- · Commission new services
- · Check the quality of our practice
- Listen to voices of children and young people
